The Scholarship Programme

The Galilee Foundation continues to develop its Scholarship Programme and is proud to report its achievements for the 2013-14 academic year.

Thanks to the help of the Foundation's friends we were able to support 250 students with university scholarships in the 2013/14 academic year. This year, 60 of our students will be graduating from their universities, as well as from the Foundation's Scholarship Programme, which has supported and accompanied the majority of them for three years.

Our scholarship students study a variety of topics including medicine and other medical studies, engineering, physical and biological sciences, social science, law, the humanities and other professions. Many would not have been able to complete their

The Programme organised a variety of training activities throughout the year for the scholarship students, including literature workshops discussing *Men in the Sun*, a novel by the prominent Palestinian novelist, Ghassan Kanafani; critical thinking and leadership workshops; a study day examining challenges facing Palestinians in Israel. Students were also given guided historical tours of Akka and Ghabseya, a destroyed Palestinian village, as part of their 'Journey to the Roots' activity day.

'Giving Back to the Community' is an important aspect of the Scholarship Programme in which our students commit to volunteer work with community and civil society organisations. This year about 3,500 persons benefited directly from the volunteering programme, including 3,290 children and youth. The student volunteers were enlisted with 10 civil society organisations, which highly praised the programme and students' involvement. Mentorship Initiative

creative and important ideas to suggest for improving the project."

Al-Mashghal is a non-profit, independent organiation working to increase awareness and cultural cohesion among the Palestinian minority, mainly in the field of music and the arts.

Its General Director, Habib Shehadeh Hanna, said: "Thank you for the great effort you put into pairing up volunteers and hosting organisations, and for your follow-up on the volunteers' performance. Their contribution to the success of our activities and projects has been immense and extremely beneficial for both the organisation and the volunteers."

The indirect beneficiaries of the volunteering programme runs to thousands. They include elementary and high school students and teachers who benefit from the Arab Culture Association's Curriculum project, which looks critically into the contents of the curriculum studied by Palestinians inside Israel.

Another major development has been the introduction of a specially designed database, which will allow the Foundation to administer the Programme cost effectively. The new database will also enable the Foundation to store and manage students' data more efficiently.

Other educational and research projects

Young Musicians – This past academic year, the Foundation partnered with Al-Mashghal, the Arab Centre for Arts and Culture, to support their Young Musicians project. Initially set up to benefit 30 children aged 3-18 years from disadvantaged backgrounds, the project had benefited over 100 children from Haifa and the surrounding villages by the year's end, providing them with professional musical training. Fifty of the children participated in a sold out concert in Haifa organised by Al-Mashghal.

Kindergarten in the Naqab – During the academic year of 2013/14, the Foundation worked with Yasmin al-Naqab to support and empower the kindergarten in the unrecognised village of Rahmah. The kindergarten benefits about 30 children aged 3-6 years and is the only educational facility available for the residents of the village. This unique project provided high quality training to two teachers, helped to purchase educational toys and games,

and provided awareness raising workshops around children's health for mothers.

Hewar School and Kindergarten – The Foundation will partner with Hewar, the Arab Association for Alternative Education, for the 2014/15 academic year to support their school and kindergarten. Hewar is an alternative public school for Palestinian children in Haifa and the surrounding villages. The project provides an alternative, democratic, creative, engaging and childcentred education to children aged 3 to 13 years.

Mada al-Carmel – the Arab Centre for Applied Social Research – The Foundation renewed its support to Mada al-Carmel's Israeli Studies Programme, which addresses social, political and historic questions on the Israeli state and society, to enable it to reach a more diverse constituency. The Programme provides informative academic papers, books and online publications on its areas of research.

Window to the Galilee

Our 'Window to the Galilee' programme organises events in London and elsewhere in the UK to introduce the Foundation's supporters and audiences in the UK to the culture and arts of the Palestinian minority in Israel and, whenever possible, from other parts of the Middle East. It aims to create constructive discussions around the diverse issues of importance to the Foundation and its beneficiaries through events.

This year, 'Window to the Galilee' held a screening in February of the film *The Muslims are Coming*, a documentary that follows Muslim American comedians across the USA. Through the screening, the programme aimed to reach a young audience and university students.

The screening was held at the School of Oriental and African Studies (SOAS) and was well attended by students and some of the Foundation's supporters.

An interactive Q&A was held following the screening, during which Mrs Sawsan Asfari – one of the coproducers of the film – along with comedians Dean Obaidallah and Negin Farsad, related to their work experience on the film and their experience as Arab and Muslim comedians in the USA.

'Window to the Galilee' also held a literary event with the renowned Turkish writer, Elif Shafak, in March at the home of Sawsan and Ayman Asfari.

Ms Shafak, an award-winning novelist and the most widely read woman writer in Turkey, spoke about politics, literature and the role of women in the Middle East. The evening was attended by about 100 people, and it was an intimate occasion where Ms Shafak answered questions on a number of topics. There was also a book signing by the author, with 20% of the proceeds donated to the Foundation.
